A LOOK BACK AT THIS UNIQUE AND CHALLENGING YEAR

Without a doubt, the 2020-2021 fiscal year was one of the most challenging years in WISH's history.

COVID-19 meant street-based sex workers faced a catastrophic global pandemic while continuing to navigate an unprecedented toxic drug supply, a homelessness and poverty crisis, lost income, disproportionate rates of violence, and fewer safe spaces.

Because of COVID-19, we immediately saw a severe exacerbation of those pre-existing crises. As the world rushed to go back to "normal," we worried about returning to a status quo that had been broken for years. Despite years of repeated and increasingly desperate calls for urgently needed resources from organizations like WISH, resources only became available because of COVID-19.

One-time emergency funding allowed us to focus on increasing programming and services that had been urgently needed for a long time. It is WISH's commitment to maintain each of these much-needed programs and services, a commitment that is made possible thanks to the support of our donors.

We are extremely proud that we never closed our doors nor scaled back services. What you'll read in this annual report are all the measures WISH took to advocate for street-based sex workers, as well as how we were able to quickly adapt to expand and create new services in the midst of multiple crises.

At the time of writing this, we celebrate the one-year anniversary of the opening of Canada's first-ever 24/7 emergency shelter for sex workers. It's remarkable to look back and see all that was accomplished. We are forever grateful for your support, and to all our staff and volunteers for continuing to support those who depend on WISH.

Please join us in looking back over this unique and extremely challenging year.

A YEAR OF NAVIGATING MULTIPLE CRISES

DROP-IN

- Showers and bathrooms at the Drop-In open
 24/7 for the first time in WISH's history
- More than 100,000 meals served during the vear
- Approximately 300 participants welcomed on average every day
- Participants accessed clothing and makeup donation rooms about 1,800 times each month



MAP VAN

- MAP Van began operating 12 hours a day instead of six
- MAP Van day shift served as many sex workers as the night shift
- More than 1200 Narcan (overdose reversal) kits distributed
- Staff connected with street-based sex workers more than 19,000 times
- More than 90,000 sterile needles handed out
- 62,632 condoms distributed
- 32 Bad Date Reports taken



MUSIC THERAPY, AHSP, LEARNING CENTRE

- All were affected by COVID-19 pandemic due to the close-proximity of group work
- All programs constantly changed and revised due to COVID-19 restrictions
- As many activities as possible were moved outdoors to WISH's safe respite area
- WISH Learning Centre celebrates 20 years

SAFE RESPITE

- WISH opened a 24/7 safe respite area in response to spaces closing or scaling back, and dramatically fewer safe sanitation options for women and gender-diverse people
- Area houses 5-toilet washroom trailer to meet demand
- Participants described the safe respite area and services as a "vital necessity"
- 63% of WISH participants using the washroom trailer identified as having disabilities
- 33% are experiencing homelessness
- More than a quarter of the folks coming to the respite area used the space more than once a day

PEER WITNESSING

- Operates within the WISH 24/7 safe respite area
- More than 35 peers from the Supportive Employment Program offer support and provide overdose prevention
- More than 1,000 crack kits distributed to participants per month
- Peers gave out almost 20 Narcan kits every month
- Peers helped facilitate more than 50 health referrals every month
- More than 450 participants served each month by the Peer Witnessing and Peer Safety staff



SUPPORTIVE EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM

- Number of peers working in the Supportive Employment Program (SEP) almost tripled
- Peers achieve wage parity; wages increased to a fair and equitable level
- New SEP Lead positions introduced, working closely with participants in the Drop-In Centre and new WISH shelter
- WISH's first-ever Peer Witnessing positions introduced to protect against, and reverse accidental overdoses



SHELTER

- Most residents report fewer instances of violence thanks to the shelter
- Many residents also report the ability to turn down potentially dangerous work
- Crash beds used more than 500 times during the first 6 months
- Participants turned away more than 400 times since opening day due to limited capacity
- More than 700 loads of laundry done during first 6 months
- Five women have been in the shelter for more than 4 months

INREACH

- Inreach programming became more important than ever as many other DTES services and supports closed or became unavailable to participants
- Program became a crucial bridge between participants and all of WISH's programs and services
- Amidst the pandemic, participants' needs became more urgent and more complex, requiring far more one-on-one supports than ever before
- Inreach staff quickly became participants' primary help navigating increasingly complex needs
- Staff helped participants with mental health supports, medical appointments, legal matters, housing, social assistance, and more

APRIL

WISH Emergency Response Team formed to rapidly respond to COVID-19

Courage Campaign launched: WISH mobilizes to highlight devastating effects of the pandemic on street-based sex workers. Campaign includes calls to action and requests to all levels of government to address ongoing need for safe spaces, food, information, sanitation and essential services

JUNE

Donation clothing room re-opens to participants

Mobile Access Project (MAP) Van day shift begins

AUGUST

WISH opens satellite office a few blocks away at 312 Main to accommodate some of WISH's program managers, supervisors and admin staff as programs and services continue to expand at 334 Alexander Street

MAY

Peer Witnessing introduced as part of the Supportive Employment Program to respond to dramatic increase of accidental overdoses occurring in the DTES

WISH opens 24/7 for the first time in history

WISH's backlot converted into 24/7 safe respite area featuring a 5-toilet washroom trailer in response to the urgent need for safe spaces and access to basic sanitation

Scotiabank Charity Challenge in-person event cancelled

JULY

WISH joins more than 90 organizations calling for an immediate ban on the arbitrary, racist, and illegal practice of <u>police street checks</u> in B.C. For disproportionately Indigenous, Black, trans, and low-income sex workers trading sex on the street, repeated wellness checks on various strolls pushes the trade further underground

OCTOBER

Canada's first emergency shelter for streetbased sex workers opens at WISH. While women make up about 47% of the DTES community, this percentage is not reflected in the amount of available safe spaces, housing, shelter beds, and drop-ins

DECEMBER

WISH Learning Centre celebrates 20 years

WISH, DTES Women's Centre and Atira express outrage and call for an immediate action plan to end pandemic of gender-based violence in the DTES. Organizations called on all levels of government for a coordinated action plan due to the rampant culture of sexualized violence in the DTES

FEBRUARY

In collaboration with WISH, <u>CBC Radio series</u> <u>airs</u>, centering the voices and sharing the experiences of current and former street-based sex workers

B.C.-wide Bad Date Reporting system for sex workers announced. The provincial BDAR system will be the first of its kind in Canada, and one of a select few "geographically linked" reporting systems that exist internationally

SEPTEMBER

Drop-In renovations begin for clothing and make up donation rooms

NOVEMBER

WISH hosts <u>virtual panel discussion about</u> the profound impacts of COVID-19 on streetbased and im/migrant sex workers

JANUARY

WISH joins coalition of organizations calling for an end to VPD's Trespass Prevention

Program. The program further criminalizes and stigmatizes poverty, and gives more power to the police to harass and criminalize street-based sex workers at any time, even if there is no actual public safety issue

MARCH

WISH launches <u>WISH Talks: Creating</u> <u>Impact Through Conversation</u> in honour of International Women's Day. Through the series, we will strive to center the voices, experiences and realities of street-based sex workers. We want to have the challenging, and sometimes difficult, conversations needed to create impactful and meaningful change

^{*} A word about government funding: The province of B.C. through BC Housing provides WISH with an annual funding commitment to operate the Shelter and 80% of the Drop-In costs, while the BC Ministry of Public Safety partially funds the operations of the MAP Van.
